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C.S. LEWIS

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C. S. 'Jack' Lewis first met the Moore family at the age of 18 whilst at the Officers Training Corps, Keble College, Oxford. Janie Moore was the mother of Jack's friend and roommate Paddy, and Maureen, then 11, his sister. They lived nearby the college and quickly became welcome, stable fixtures in Jack's life. Lewis' own mother had died young - he wrote in *Surprised by Joy* that with his mother's death "all settled happiness, all that was tranquil and reliable, disappeared from my life" - while his father was notably distant and disinterested.

In November 1917, when Paddy and Jack were sent to the front line, they made a pact to look after each other's families if either of them didn't return home. Jack was quickly wounded, hospitalised in France and then sent back to England to recover. Paddy was killed in action at Pargny, he was only 19 years of age. True to his word Jack moved in with Maureen and Janie, first living in a series of rented houses in Oxford before they, along with his brother Warren (Warnie), purchased *The Kilns* on the outskirts of the city in 1930. Maureen remained at *The Kilns* with her mother and the Lewis brothers until she married Leonard James Blake (with Jack's encouragement) in 1940 at age 33. Blake was a music teacher and for more than two decades the Director of Music at Malvern College (both Lewis boys were educated at Malvern, and it is widely recognised that Jack's time there, in particular the gas lamps and landscape, helped inspire the *Chronicles of Narnia*). Leonard and Maureen had two children, Jack Lewis was godfather to their son Richard.

Jack and Janie lived together at *The Kilns* until 1951, when after developing dementia Janie was moved to a nursing home. Jack visited her every day until her death later that same year. It has been suggested that the complicated characters of *mother* in *The Screwtape Letters* (item 4) and *Pam* in *The Great Divorce* (item 7) are partly based on Janie.

In 1963 Maureen unexpectedly inherited a baronetcy and its attached Scottish estate through her father's line,

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making her one of only four baronetesses in British history.

Her last meeting with Jack was in the summer of 1963, in the hospital where Jack had suffered a heart attack whilst being treated for kidney failure.

Lewis hadn't recognized any visitors on the day she visited, so she entered quietly and said,

"Jack, it's Maureen", to which he replied, *"No. It's Lady Dunbar of Hempriggs".*

Stunned, Maureen said, "Oh Jack, how could you remember that?"

"On the contrary", he said, grinning, "how could I forget a fairy tale?"

Jack died in November that same year bringing to an end 45 years of friendship.

Leonard passed away in 1989 and Maureen in 1997, the final passages of *The Last Battle* were read at her funeral.

The following 21 books, all by or relating to C. S. Lewis are from the library of Leonard and Maureen Blake. Only one bears Lewis' presentation inscription.

The contents, with the ownership name of Leornard Blake dated 'Dec, 19th 1941' in blue ink on the front endpaper, and some spotting to the margins throughout, are otherwise clean. Four pages of publisher's adverts to the rear, as called for. Complete with the rubbed, nicked and torn dustwrapper that is chipped with loss to the spine tips and has faint pencil notes (in the hand of Leonard Blake) to the lower portion of the darkened and mildly spotted rear panel.

Both the book and dustwrapper are in the second state, likely a remainder issue (Currey state B), the sheets and dustwrapper are the same in both issues with the exception of a cheaper binding (without gilt) on the book, and the original printed price on the dustwrapper of '7s 6d net' clipped from the lower front flap and 'first cheap edition 3s. 6d net' overprinted in red above. The first and by far the scarcest volume in C. S. Lewis' Space Trilogy. The novel was written during 1937 after a conversation with J. R. R. Tolkien in which both men lamented the state of contemporary fiction. They agreed that Lewis would write a space travel story and Tolkien would write a time travel story. Tolkien never completed his story (a fragment of his attempt 'The Lost Road' was eventually published in volume 5 of the History of Middle-Earth series), Lewis however went on to write two further volumes 'Perelandra' (1943) and 'That Hideous Strength' (1945).

'Broadcast Talks' is printed on thin wartime paper and without free endpapers, as issued. The bindings are firm with a little bumping to the extremities, the cloth with a touch of spotting or the odd light mark are clean and fresh. The contents, all with the ownership inscription of Leonard Blake, to the pastedown in 'Broadcast Talks', to the endpapers of 'Christian Behaviour' and 'Beyond Personality'. 'Broadcast Talks' and 'Christian Behaviour' are additionally inscribed by Blake on the front panels of the dustwrapper. All volumes have a little light spotting to the closed text-block edges and are sparsely highlighted and annotated in pencil by Blake throughout. Complete with the rubbed, nicked and creased dustwrappers, that of 'Broadcast Talks' with small chips and tears to the spine, and uniformly toned. All remain unclipped, each priced 2s 6d on the front flaps.

James Welch, the Director of Religious Broadcasting at the BBC had been impressed by C. S. Lewis's 1940 book 'The Problem of Pain' and wrote to him asking if he would be interested in giving a series of live broadcasts on Christianity,

to which Lewis responded enthusiastically. The resulting talks, each lasting between 10 and 15 minutes proved popular with the public, with some earning over 1.5 million listeners. Four series of talks were broadcast between 1941 and 1944, coming to nearly six hours of audio. The broadcasts, revised and expanded by Lewis, are published in print here for the first time. 'Broadcast Talks' contains two parts, the first a philosophical argument for the existence of God and the second a brief attempt to pin down and advocate Christian thought and ideology. 'Christian Bahavior' consists of 12 sections which explore Christian ethics. 'Beyond Personality' contains talks on the Christian idea of God and of man's relationship to God. The broadcasts were combined and published in one volume in 1952 under the title 'Mere Christianity', which has come to be considered a classic of Christian literature.

Presentation copies of the first printing of Lewis' masterpiece of satirical fiction are exceedingly rare. Just one inscribed first edition is recorded at auction since publication (Christies, South Kensington, 11 November 1992, Lot 106: The Property of the late John Arlott, O.B.E. English Literature). The dedication copy (inscribed for J. R. R. Tolkien) is also known to have changed hands a couple of times, alas not ours.

Rather than being the focus of the book, the details of Lewis's life are given rather to provide context and support to the spiritual concept that he calls 'Joy'. Lewis describes 'Joy' as a beguiling and ephemeral feeling of longing that he first experienced as a child when remembering a toy garden and while reading Beatrix Potter's 'Squirrel Nutkin' and Longfellow's 'Saga of King Olaf', concluding that this feeling was guiding him to God and the Christian path.
